

Definitions

- Intersex: Person born with a reproductive or sexual anatomy that doesn't fit the typical definitions of female or male sex. Socially constructed biologic category that reflects natural diversity of sexual anatomy. Distinct from gender identity.
- REMEMBER: terminology may not be universal, and that individual patients' needs & identity terminology may vary



Harmful Intersex Terminology

Avoid using:


- Disorders of Sex Development (DSD)
 - Introduced in medical community in 2005
 - Controversial and pathologizing
 - Some advocates replace "disorders" with "differences", but most intersex community members prefer avoiding

Hermaphrodite

- Outdated, medically inaccurate term
- Derogatory











(combination of tissue)

(can be internal)

Or undeveloped streak gonads

Examples of Intersex Variations

- 46, XX salt-wasting Congenital Adrenal Hyperplasia (SWCAH)
- Androgen Insensitivity Syndrome (AIS)
- 46, XY complete gonadal dysgenesis (Swyer Syndrome)
- 46, XY partial gonadal dysgenesis
- 5 alpha reductase-3 deficiency (5 ARD deficiency) and 17betahydroxysteroid dehydrogenase-3 deficiency (17 BHSD deficiency)
- Ovotesticular DSD
- Mayer-Rokitansky-Kuster-Hauser (MRKH)
- Hypospadias and Epispadias
- XO Turner Syndrome (TS)
- XXY Klinefelter syndrome





Intersex people are 0.5% to 2%* of the population.

*About as common as having twin births (~3%)

**Compared to the U.S. population of transgender adults, self-reporting at 0.6% in a 2016 study

History of surgery to "fix" intersex kids

- Lore of "social emergency" of gender assignment
 - Parental fear of ambiguous genitalia
 - Often told (w/ certainty) that gonads will become cancerous
- Clitoral resection/recession
- Gonadectomy
- Vaginoplasty
- Hypospadias/epispadias repair
- "Normalization" of sex organs



Corrective surgery for ambiguous genitalia

PROS

- reduce parental embarrassment and anxiety?
- infant surgery may be less technically challenging (though doctors with experience with transgender surgery are changing this paradigm)
- possible benefits to intervening before memory of surgery persists

CONS

- irreversible
- risks of pediatric anesthesia becoming more and more apparent
- discordant gender identification can be "catastrophic"
- potential for chronic pain and lasting adverse effects

The perils of our assumptions of gender- & hetero-normativity

- 12.8% of girls with CAH exhibited gender identity disorder
 - n=39
 - Pastereski V et al. Arch Sex Behav. 2015; 44: 1363-1375
- 14% of adults with CAH identified with a gender opposite their assignment at infancy
 - n=28 (24 virilizing, 4 salt wasting)
 - yet study authors state in their introduction: "for physicians it is obvious and unequivocal that a person with CAH and an XX karyotype has a female gender identity"
 - Binet et al. J Ped Surg. 2016; 51: 465-468
- 25% of adults with DSD were dissatisfied with gender allocation
 - n=69
 - Schweizer K et al. Psychology & Sexuality. 2013; 5(1): 56-82
- 33% of girls with CAH developed gender dysphoria that reduced HRQoL
 - n=33
 - Jürgensen M et al Eur J Pediatr 2014; 173: 893–903



What Intersex People Wished Their Providers Knew

- Offer peer support and therapy; let them know they're not alone
- Don't assume gender identity or sexual orientation
- Ask patient how they would like the medical exam to go
- Give patient the option of who they want in the room with them (family members, other med professionals)
- Don't give a genital exam if simply for curiosity
- Have a pediatric speculum nearby
- Don't take pictures of their genitals
